



#### The Start of the Corridor repainting



## From the Archives MV Fulmar - Bryan and Babs Roberts

This is the account of a trip from York to Derby Boat Club after buying a motor cruiser at Naburn Marina York, a distance of approximately 140 miles.

On a late September day in 1999 we took possession of NV Fulmar a 32ft Princess. The plan was to sail the boat from York to Derby via the Ouse to the Trent. We did give it a thought that we might go the full length of the Ouse via Trent Falls but this was counted out due to tide and having to find somewhere to moor overnight and not knowing the river this was discounted. The other alternative was taking the boat off the river at Selby lock and going through the canal system to join the Stainforth and Keadby Navigation and then onto Keadby Lock and on to the Trent. On a bright sunny morning after passing through Naburn Lock we were met with a great deal of rubbish floating down the river, calling up Cawood Swing Bridge on the VHF they had the bridge open for our passage, the bridge was negotiated without any problems. The next obstacle was the two swing bridges at Selby, for those who have not sailed this part of the river Ouse, its narrow between the two bridges anand on a double bend. We called up the bridge keeper and asked for the bridge to be opened as it would be impossible to stop with the river running fast and it being narrow going round the last bend. We saw the bridges open for us and we made a swift exit through. Within a short distance, approximately half a mile, is Selby lock. On the right hand side of the water running fast we slowed right down. This was going to be rather difficult to turn against the flow of the river, so we decided to turn after the lock and head back into the flow which we did and after a little manoeurving we did eventually get into the lock and was glad when the gates closed behind us. After having a break for lunch in Selby maring we headed off through various locks which we had to open and close ourselves. We arrived at our overnight stop at Bank Dole (by the tar works) and after a Chinese takeaway, stayed for the night.

After breakfast we moved on again through the locks and swing bridges. We made our way onto the Stainforth and Keadby canal and passing through marinas, we arrived at the rail swing bridge over the canal. After calling on the radio to the bridge keeper, we asked if he was able to swing the rail bridge. We had to wait as this line is very busy. We had to wait until he had a clear slot to open the bridge, so we moored up and had lunch eventually the bridge opened and we made a quick passage thought. This was the final obstacle before reaching Keady lock. We stayed overnight and another boat narrowboat Cruiser joined us for tomorrows passage up the Trent and on to Torksey Lock.

The following morning the wind was blowing rather strong and after looking down onto the river Trent, waves were forming with white tops and as we needed to get to Derby Boat Club we felt we had to go. On entering the lock the keeper advised us that it would be very choppy and to be careful. Entering into the main river the waves were strong, but Fulmar performed well with spray coming over the bow, we make steady progress towards Torksey, passing Gainsborough, the wind eased slightly and we were able to make better progress and arrived into Torksey lock for the night around 6pm

The other craft that departed Keadby was a narrowboat Cruiser heading for West Stockwith maring and she was rocking with the swell and making very slow headway. Morning dawned to a fine day with only a light breeze after making good progress we locked into Cromwell lock and off the tidal section eventually locking through Nether Lock (Newark) and Newark Town lock, feeling rather tired we moored up for the night. The rain and the wind that night was horrendous and this continued into the morning. We departed Newark and headed for Gunthorpe and the pontoon moorings. Progress was rather slow but eventually we arrived in Nottingham and locked through into the Beeston Canal. We know thought it should not take long to get to DMBC at Sawley (how wrong could you be)! We heard that the navigation on the river had been closed above Nottingham due to heavy rain further up the Trent and the river had gone into flood. What do you do next, well we decided to moor up at Castle marina who told us we could stay for a few days until the water subsided and the river water level dropped. We could then leave the Beeston Canal and continue on our journey towards Derby. In between times, we decided to return home for a few days. Fortunately I have a good friend in Nottingham who gave us a lift back to our car at Derby Boat Club. Three days later we returned to Castle Marina and continued our journey to Derby Motor Boat Club where a number of members were waiting to help us moor up. We did spend many happy years boating on the Trent.
